Keynote Speaker - Dr. Kirsten Greer

"Why Geography Matters:

Place-Based Reparative Research"



Dr. Greer explores repatriation and repair-work through exhibitions, online collections, and museum research through a First Nation-university-museum partnership. She will discuss 'Why Geography Matters,' via three international projects with the Chicago Field Museum, Carnegie Museum of Natural History, and University of Colorado, Colorado Springs.

Dr. Kirsten Greer, Associate Professor at Nipissing University and Canada Research Chair in Global Environmental Histories and Geographies, specializes in reparative environmental histories.

She has collaborated with Dokis First Nation, Nipissing First Nation, and the North Bay Museum on a First Nation-university-museum partnership while integrating humanities and geophysical sciences, to address global environmental challenges.
