The year did not start off as planned. Unfortunately, for the students and staff at Westwood Elementary School the summer involved the loss of their school in late July. The month of August was spent on planning for the many moving parts of a school community including classroom space and furniture, classroom resources, schedules, infrastructure and supplies, staffing, lunch program logistics and bussing. It seemed for every problem solved; a new issue emerged. The loss of the school was the major priority and required an early return to work for many. Many thanks to those who were a part of the planning and implementation. The loss was felt hard in the community, but resilience and patience have made the process manageable.

The district staff continued their work in the areas of professional development. There were over 40 staff involved with the Manitoba Rural Learning Consortium. The MRLC provided professional development on numeracy, literacy, school leadership and trauma informed practices. Staff dedicated time to meeting at least 4 times over the year to learn about the sessions they were enrolled in and share practices tried and learned. Currently, on the numeracy front, the lead is completing her training to be a numeracy coach. The

district is fortunate to have many expert leaders in literacy and numeracy throughout the district who can share their knowledge with students and staff. These educators are always learning, too.

Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning have also released the new *Manitoba Framework for Learning*. A district team of five has been attending sessions in Winnipeg to learn about the framework and to become facilitators for the district. The district professional development in May was the overview for the framework. The framework provides educators with the MEECL philosophy on education, all curricula and global competencies. A major principle of the document is on **pimo-pimatisiwin** – walking in a good way. More information can be found at https://www.edu.gov.mb.ca/k12/framework/index.htm

This was the first year that the Universal Nutrition Program was rolled out in the province. The nutrition program was a welcomed addition for schools but did come with added responsibilities for schools. Schools had to consider staff, space and inclusion for all students. Each school was responsible for providing plans and budgets to the province as well as providing interim reports. Some schools were able to provide staff and space, but others were limited in both for various reasons. With the financial assistance of the province and other grants, the program will continue to grow in the district. The district was very fortunate to secure some fantastic people to ensure that all students had access to healthy food.

Attendance continues to be a concern for the district. It is a known fact that to be successful in school, one needs to be present. There are several resources available for students to help improve their attendance. There are school based resources as well as district resources such as the Family Outreach Coordinator and the Mental Health and Wellness Coordinator. There are 3 Community Schools, soon to be four with the addition of R. D. Parker Collegiate, that provided many opportunities for families to participate in their schools. This also included summer programming. This year, funds were secured for a Wapanohk Community School van and a high school minibus. These 2 vehicles are designated for caregivers who do not have the means to transport their children to school. Both should be on the road for the 2025-2026 school year.

Indigenous education and the road to reconciliation remained a commitment for staff and students. The Elders and Knowledge Keepers grant, along with district dollars provided schools with many opportunities for everyone to learn more about the area in which we reside through history, culture and traditions. The district participated in treaty education training, book studies, ribbon / shirt teaching, full moon ceremonies, land-based learning, paint nights, the blanket exercise and the Indigenous Map of Canada. There is a recognition that everyone is at a different place in their understanding and that it is important to provide opportunities for everyone to build upon their knowledge.

In closing, this will be my last report to the community. I have been in a senior administration role for the last fifteen years and with the district since 1998. I have seen the growth of the district and am proud of the work that has been done. I have seen many changes and challenges over the years. This work cannot be done alone but with many great educators and supporters, people who are resilient and change makers. There are challenges and those are reflected in the district and school-based plans that will be released at the end of October. I have enjoyed the many opportunities that I have had with the district and the many partners including Manitoba Association of School Superintendents and the Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning.

All the best to the students and staff at the School District of Mystery Lake! It has been a pleasure serving you all.

Focus Area #2: Improvement of foundational literacy and numeracy skills


Literacy and math are a focus in classroom instruction. We see the value in expressing ourselves orally and in written form and encourage students to see that math and literacy skills are integrated into the world around us. Some examples of this integration in our school this year include:



Author David A. Robertson did a live Zoom visit with all of our students. He spoke about his writing process, encouraged students to develop their own, and spoke about the motivation behind some of his books that many of our students have read.

<u>Focus Area #3</u> Development of strong French communication skills and increase student confidence speaking French.

Teachers are making concerted efforts to have their students continue to practice speaking French in front of their classes and other French Immersion students. Some examples of these activities include Mme Pankratz' students explaining and playing their designed math games with other French classes, and grade 3-8 students writing and presenting their French speeches for Concour d'art oratoire, with finalists pre-



senting in front of all of our FI students. Our Grade 8 classes travelled to Festival du Voyageur in Winnipeg where our FI students had the opportunity to practice their French oral abilities in authentic surroundings. Many classes have 'buddies' where they practice speaking French with students outside of their classes. Leaning a second language is difficult, but our students and staff support each other along the way.





NEW FOR 2024-2025

UNIVERSAL NUTRITION PROGRAM





In September 2024, Nello Altomare, Minister of Education, introduced Canada's first Universal Nutrition program to ensure no child in a classroom in Manitoba went hungry. With a significant budget, Wapanohk Community School hired a Nutrition Procurer and other staff to help get this program off the ground. At the beginning of the school year, we provided breakfast snacks that students could access all day. At the beginning of October, we were providing a breakfast bin that had 3 of the basic food groups, and a take home lunch that every student could partake in. These lunches also had 3 of the basic food groups. Some lunches included stews, spaghetti and meat sauce, and grilled cheese sandwiches. Out of this budget, we were able to seriously upgrade our kitchen, We purchased a new freezer and commercial refrigerators. A new dishwashing station, handwashing station, and a new dishwasher were installed as well. We now meet the health requirements comparable to any restaurant kitchen in the province. Every child who needs food gets it.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION IMPROVEMENTS

Our Arbor had been completely refurbished! All structural issues with poles, beams and rafters have been fixed. The poles were reset and the beams and rafters were strongly reinforced. As well, the ceremonial pole was replaced and the Arbor now has a permanent metal roof. To address the issue of drainage, a gravel base topped with pressed sand replaces the perpetual soggy grass. Bleachers were also built and surround the Arbor. Lastly, the broken fire pit was replaced by a larger, heavy-duty metal one and placed near the Arbor. We are quite pleased with the results.



Strategies/Results

At R.D. Parker, we realize that not all students will graduate within a four year time frame. With that in mind, we started a new programsto help our students cross the stage, even if it takes a little longer. In 2024 we started our grade 9-12 off campus program (The OC). Designed for students who struggled with school in junior high, the morning OC classes were dedicated to helping grade 9 students develop routines in a smaller environment, experience some success and transfer to the main R.D. Parker building when the students felt ready. Our afternoon OC classes were aimed at students who struggled at the high school, giving them smaller classes and fewer teachers.

This year, R.D. Parker was proud to announce the opening of our new band room. This room has been a long time in the making and we finally had our grand opening on January 23. Vice Principal Jeff Paradis was the emcee for the event and it was attended by various dignitaries including Superintendent of Human Resources and Policy, Angele Bartlett, Mayor Colleen Smook, several SDML trustees and Grand Chief Settee. Community members were invited and it was nice to see current and former band members gathered together. There were performances by R.D. Parker Vocal Jazz, the R.D. Parker



Brass Ensemble and selected grade 9 band students. The evening ended with cake, coffee and tea for everyone to enjoy.

We are happy to report that this nutrition program will continue.

R.D. Parker was proud to host two cultural days this year. The first happened in the fall. We invited people from Winnipeg's Folklorama representing Nigerian and Indigenous cultures. They performed in the Letkemann Theatre, displaying traditional dances and even had students join them on stage to participate.

The second day happened in the spring. On this day, students had the opportunity to celebrate their culture. Students made displays showing important aspects of their culture including traditional foods, dress and traditions. Students and staff were encouraged to wear traditional clothing and some students performed traditional dances in the theatre or gave Power point presentations regarding their culture. Everyone had a great time.



Student Services in the Educational Planning Process

Most students achieve the expected learning outcomes of provincial curricula with the support of teachers who use a variety of instructional and assessment strategies and resources. For some students, teachers and parents will identify that they are experiencing learning challenges, which then leads to conversations about next steps. Collaborative planning to support students occurs across many levels. The level of supports required for a student determines the size and composition of the team supporting the planning and the development of a student specific plan if needed.

The team begins with the student, classroom teacher(s) and parent(s). Some other members of the student's team may include school administrators, school counsellor, resource teacher and educational assistants. If a more comprehensive approach is needed, the team expands to involve others such as an occupational therapist, physiotherapist, speech and language pathologist or psychologist. The School District of Mystery Lake contracts services of these professionals to help assess and develop programming for students.

During the 2024-2025 school year, students were referred for specialized services using a priority system. There was both in person and virtual services provided by the clinicians. Below is a break down of assessments/students seen by clinician type:

Therapy Equipment : Occupational Therapy – 5 in person visits, 49 students seen, 57 consultations

Physiotherapy – 5 in person visits, 35 students seen, 62 consultations

Speech/Language – 2 in person visits with 2 SLP's, 51 students referred, virtual therapy provided weekly in all elementary schools, implementation of several Augmentative and Alternative Communication devices throughout all schools to assist individual students who have difficulties with verbal communication.





Psychologists – 5 in person visits between 4 psychologists, 40 assessments completed

The role of clinicians in developing programming and recommendations for students is invaluable. Unfortunately, there are waiting lists to access these professionals and schools do their best to prioritize referrals based on student needs. If you have any questions about your child's programming or would like to know if they would benefit from involvement from a clinician, please speak to your child's teacher.

- Co-supported two "kōkom in the school" *mino pimàtisiwin* (living a good life) programs
- Continued to provide teachers with Cree resources and other supports as requested


Literacy Support Team

The School District of Mystery Lake Literacy Support Team had another busy and productive school year. In addition to participating in various camps and special activities for students and the wider community, our focus this year has been aligning district literacy approaches and resources with best practices rooted in proven research.

Acadience Universal Screener

To that effect, Literacy Support has proposed the implementation of various changes to improve literacy outcomes for our students. One such change is in the tools we use to assess students' current literacy abilities. Accurate assessment is essential for teachers to effectively



gauge what skills students currently have and where to go next. During this past school year, the Acadience Universal Screening assessment was piloted in two of our elementary schools with students in Grades 1 and 2. Not only did teachers find this assessment more time efficient, it also provided them with more targeted and specific data for each student. In conjunction with the mandate from Manitoba's Department of Education and Early Childhood Learning, we are expanding our pilot to all Grades 1-3 students in all schools. To ensure the validity and reliability of these assessments, all classroom teachers, as well as administrators and intervention and resource teachers were trained in administering the Acadience Universal Screener in June.



UFLI Foundations

Building on the success seen in individual classrooms across the district, teachers were offered multiple opportunities to be trained in implementing the *UFLI Foundations* program, which targets early foundational skills that students need to become proficient readers. Over 60 teachers attended these professional development sessions and were able to receive continued support from our team. In the coming year, an expectation has been established that all early years classrooms use an approach to teaching phonological awareness and phonics that is explicit and systematic. To support teachers, we will be introducing a Scope and Sequence for grades 1-3 to ensure that skills taught progress in difficulty and build from year to year.

Professional Development

If we expect our students to value continued education, we as teachers should be following that expectation ourselves. After many requests, we decided to once again offer our PD series based on the book *Shifting the Balance* (K-2). Six times over the course of the year, teachers met to participate in a book study that was directed at increasing student literacy skills through evidence-based, explicit, and systematic teaching practices. During this time, teachers explored the science behind how the brain learns to read, and learned how small *shifts* in their classrooms can lead to big growth in our students' reading and writing. Additionally, we offered another similar series based on the newly released middle-years ver-



sion of the *Shifting the Balance* book. This version built upon the foundational skills of the early years and provided teachers with research-based instructional strategies to target comprehension, vocabulary, and fluency. At the end of both series, we were able to invite participants to Literacy Make & Take events where teachers received many of the teaching manipulatives and tools that were highlighted throughout the book studies. They also received some



Content-Specific Text Sets

Literacy Support was able to expand our collection of content-specific text sets this year, with a focus on Kindergarten to Grade 4. Text sets are collections of sources that support a common theme, and include a variety of genres, text types, levels and formats. We were able to expand our science collection, while also including social studies and art kits. The themes of these 6 kits, based on provincial curriculum, include: Space, Weather, Cells and DNA, States of Matter, Human Rights, Artists, and All About Animals. These sets allow teachers to use connected texts for intentional knowledge building, and allow students to

actively work to develop expertise related to grade-level content area standards. We also expanded our literacy support lending collection to include a variety of high quality picture books; this was partly intended to complement PD opportunities on the power of read alouds.

Numeracy Support

The School District of Mystery Lake strives to provide our students with a variety of programs and activities to help set the foundation for all future learning. It supports the provincial philosophy of minopimatisiwin or "The Good Life" which refers to "living a well-balanced life where all four components of a human are being addressed – emotional, physical, mental and spiritual." With this perspective, areas of difficulty for both students and teachers can be addressed through collaboration, planning, and programming.



This year, we focused on further developing the skill set of our Numeracy Support workers, so that they could provide the differentiated services unique to their own school community. Training to assist with the JAM Assessments for early years allowed us to provide earlier interventions for our children. Each school team worked in collaboration with the Math Lead to identify their own focus groups which ranged from kindergarten to grade 5. It is exciting to see that many of our younger students were able to fill gaps which in turn allowed us to expand our parameters and work with some of the older students. The next stage of development is an addition program which will aid in the flexibility, fluency and development of computation skills through mental math strategies. This program will be introduced to both the early year numeracy workers as well as the grade 4-8 NAP 2.0 participants through in-class visits and book studies.

Numeracy Support Continued

This past year, we celebrated the Fifth Annual Grade One akihtaso camp. Numeracy Support Workers from each of the elementary schools joined the Curriculum Services Team and learned how to set up an outdoor camp. Prior to setting up the prospector tents, mounds of snow had to be removed. We were

very tired. Once again, test results from Strong Beginnings/Strong Endings were analyzed, then appropriate lessons and activities were selected. Misconceptions were eliminated and there were multiply opportunities to master skills in the natural world. It is quite comical hearing children talk about the ascending and descending order of pretend poop/scat. Additional math kits will need to be created as our students are progressing from a number thought process into more of an additive thinking trajectory.



The School District of Mystery Lake will be starting its fourth cohort of grade 4-9 teachers who will participate in the Numeracy Achievement Program through the Manitoba Rural Learning Consortium. This program is about using very specific student data to inform teachers how to differentiate their teaching while personalizing their own learning. Teachers work within parameters of the program to develop collective understanding of what works best for the students in their classrooms. To date, we have 18 certified NAP teachers and 25 others working toward completing the new NAP 2.0 program. At this time, the Math Lead has completed Year One of the Coaches Training and will be starting the Facilitator Training in the fall.

I have really enjoyed this school year. Although busy, it has been so rewarding watching our children grow and succeed. Hearing them utter the statement of "I don't know the answer yet" is a reminder to all of us to persevere. Once again, our children hold our hands and show us that we can find the creative solutions that make sense. I would like to thank my whole team for allowing themselves to become uncomfortable while challenging themselves to do tasks they once thought impossible. I would like to end with a reminder: "The only way to fail at math is to stop trying. Keep going, and you'll surprise yourself." Unknown

French Coordinator / coordinatrice de français

Learning the French language is possible via several avenues in SDML. The French language is taught at École Riverside School, a dual track school, where instruction is available in both English and French Immersion. Students have opportunity to continue their French Immersion endeavors through to grade twelve in RDPC to graduate with either a French certificate or French diploma. French classes are available in most of the English elementary schools from grade 4-8, also with the option to continue French Communication & Culture classes in the high school. The following events are highlights of the year because they either allowed students to use their French language knowledge in new environments, or to be exposed to the language beyond their classrooms. These events helped validate students' linguistic, cultural and educational experiences:



With financial support from the French Second Language Revitalization Program, 42 Grade 9-12 French Immersion students travelled to Winnipeg to partake in "Le grand rassemblement" and to tour L'Université de Saint-Boniface (USB). Le grand rassemblement consisted of a morning of workshops and an outdoor afternoon of activities, aimed to gather FI highschool students from across the province in a French environment. The tour of USB provided an awareness of French post-secondary possibilities for FI students in MB, including available government grants, and of medical and law degree admissions held for French language students in universities across the country.



French Communication & Culture students across our district completed crafts designed by the Festival du Voyageur school program. This program provides connections of French and Métis culture and language.



New this year, our FI students in RDPC also competed in concours d'art oratoire in class, and then joined in École Riverside School's finals where four students earned their spot to compete at provincials in Winnipeg. Our school division participation in this event was highlighted in a news piece by CBC radio-Canada. Also new, Thompson is now an official partner of Canadian Parents for French. This partnership provided funding for French musician Damien Lussier to visit Thompson in March 2025.

Family Outreach Coordinator



The central focus of Family Outreach was building stronger connections with students, families, and community. Family Outreach attended 147 homes throughout the year, which also included the off-campus students. We met with families and students to make connections by providing supports, offering advocacy, and directing them to community resources.

Community Schools Programming

To build and reinforce these connections, the Family Outreach team worked together with SDML Community Connectors to offer a variety of programming. Three Family Camps were delivered during different seasons, and in-

cluded bannock and jam making, family artwork, blanket -making and traditional medicine teachings. These camps provided opportunities for learning on the land, as well as developing positive family relationships. Three Full Moon ceremonies were also supported at community schools; these well-attended ceremonies serve as a gathering for women and gender-diverse people to honour their connection to the cycle of the moon, and often include reflection, singing, sharing stories and teachings and a shared meal. Finally, The Family Outreach helped offer summer programming to community school fami-



lies, including a afternoon family movie, a back-to-school clothing and supplies giveaway, and a BONGO/Escape Room afternoon.

Curriculum Services Programming

Another central aspect of Family Outreach is developing and sustaining positive mental health in our students, families and larger community. This year, holiday crafts were offered to three schools, in order to give students a chance to make a gift or two for someone special in their lives. These includ-



ed Christmas ornaments, cookie tins, and no-sew throw blankets. Comedian Don Burnstick also presented our Junior High and High School students, with a focus on

mental wellness and making positive life choices. To support the strengthening of the wider community, we also invited newcomers to


Thompson as well as locals to come together for our "Connecting Cultures" evening, in the hopes that all attendees would learn and share their cultural traditions, teachings and special foods. After


a delicious potluck, a scavenger hunt on the Indigenous Peoples of Canada Giant Floor map was set up, as well as stations to learn about smudging, traditional medicines, residential schools and the local fur trade. Finally, in order to support outlining communities facing evacuations due to ongoing wildfires, we offered programming for children and youth who were staying at the TRCC in June. This including art activities, games, Lego building, and a Fun Fair for families. 




